

Treaty of Brussels 10th of June 1940

France ----- Germany

1. An immediate armistice between France and Germany, dependant on the following conditions:
2. The Surrender of Eastern and Northern France to the German Reich, as per included document.
3. The withdrawal of all German formations from Republican soil.
4. The withdrawal of all British and Canadian formations from Republican soil.
5. The surrender of all prisoners of war.
6. The limitation of the French Army to a maximum of 24 divisions, with no more than 15 permitted in mainland Europe.
7. The limitation of the French navy to:
 - i. 5 x Capital Ships
 - ii. 15 x Other squadrons of naval vessels.
8. The limitation of the French Airforce to 1,000 aircraft.
9. All other colonial possessions to be maintained by the French Republic.
10. All current treaties held by the French Republic to be cancelled.
11. The right for the armed forces of Germany to send by train only, troops, supplies and weapons through France to Spain and from Spain to Germany (to a total of $\frac{1}{4}$ of the total French Republic rail capacity, maximum per month).
12. The right for Germany to buy the oil resource in Bordeaux for 15 M \$ per quarter for a four year contracted period.
13. The right for Germany to buy the resource at At Etienne for 7 M \$ per quarter for a four year contracted period

14. The destruction of all equipment not need to man the forces mentioned above in this treaty. This should be done under the supervision of officers from the Armed forces of Germany.
15. The right for Germany to send inspection teams of 10 people per group to visit any French formation or base to make sure that France don't exceed the limitations mentioned in this treaty. No more then 30 groups of 10 men are allowed to be active in France territory at the same time.
16. When France upgrade any of its forces, the old equipment should be destroyed under the supervision of officers of the armed forces of Germany.
17. France could not sell any resource to any country that is currently at war with Germany. If any country that France has signed a trade agreement should for any reason become involved in this war as an opponent to Germany or any of its allies, the resource should be sold to Germany for the same amount of money.
